For those with a sight disability

A wooden scale model of the Cathedral and accompanying tape (running time approximately 15 minutes) is available for you and your companion. Please ask one of our guides to set this up for you. Many of our guides are also trained to offer a special tour - please ask at the Guides Desk for assistance.

Large print hymn books, self-guiding leaflets and service sheets are available from one of the stewards prior to a service in the Cathedral.

Guide dogs are welcome.

General facilities for those with special needs

Parking

8 Designated Blue badge parking bays are situated on the roadway on the western side of the Cathedral.

Wheelchairs

Two wheelchairs are available. Please ask at the Donations Desk.

Refreshments

The self-service Refectory restaurant serves a wide selection of drinks, freshly prepared hot and cold food, cakes and scones. Wheelchair accessible.

You are also welcome to use the Cloisters if wet or the Cathedral lawns for your picnic.

Toilets

Two wheelchair accessible WC's are provided. One is situated on the east side of the Cloister and the other (less suitable for motorised wheelchairs) off the Refectory restaurant. Both include baby changing facilities.

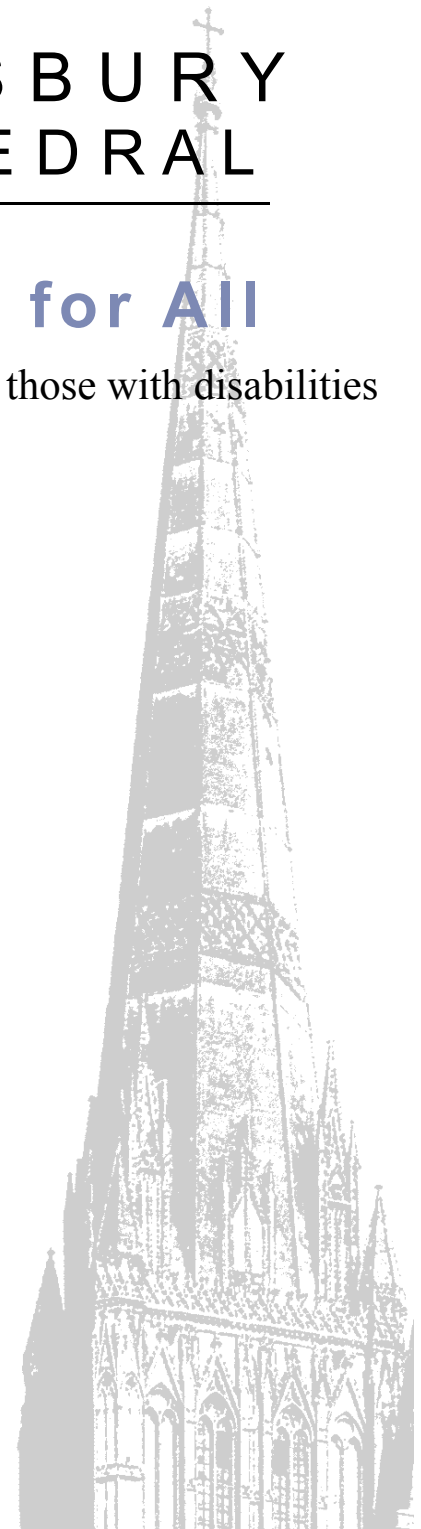

Wheelchair access

The Cathedral is relatively free of steps. Ramps have been installed wherever possible.

Where indicated by white lines, please keep to the centre section of the ramps to avoid the adverse camber.




The Morning Chapel (5 on the plan) is the most accessible area for quiet thought or private prayer.

There is a steep step between the south and north quire aisles (A on the plan) into the Presbytery High Altar area (6 on the plan). Please ask a Cathedral Guide if you would like assistance in negotiating these steps. If you find it impossible to enter the Presbytery from the side quire aisles, please access the quire from the spire crossing.

There is a very old and heavy wooden door between the south transept and the cloisters (B on the plan). Please ask one of the Guides if you need assistance in opening this door.

Visitors to the Chapter House will be able to view this breathtaking example of Gothic architecture. Stewards will be on hand to provide assistance in this area.

To avoid the turnstile and gate at the east end of the north Cloister, please either return through the Cathedral, or via the other walks in the Cloister.
